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

"I am the sparkle between dream and depth born of light reflections, water mirrors and a pinch of magic."

Like the iridescent scales of a boa, the table top unfolds a structure between clarity and movement, its irregular shape the result of an intuitive design process, shaped with dedication to craftsmanship, experimentation and the unexpected.





From fabric to furniture

With Fjara, Bretz opens another chapter of experimental material poetry. Inspired by the iconic Boa Greige velour - a fabric that embodies liquid sensuality and develops visual and tactile depth - a form was developed that was not simply transferred but speaks a new language.

Named after the Icelandic word for the tidal zone, Fjara carries this idea further: a surface as if marked by the retreat of the sea, by waves that pass and traces that remain.



Design in flux

Fjara is the result of countless attempts to grasp shapes, feel patterns and explore materials. It was not about perfection, but about expression.


Early phase, experiment, mold: the design did not follow a strict plan, but a process of discovery, with room for the unpredictable.







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Cast sensuality

Made by hand in collaboration with a foundry, hard material meets soft lines - a play of contrasts that addresses our need for naturalness and touch.

At the same time, Fjara carries an idea of permanence: aluminum can be melted down and reshaped almost without loss - ready to change again and again. A workpiece with a present, a past and a future.



"I wanted to design a table that is not immediately obvious. A statement piece that only unfolds its language when you touch it, look at it and live it in the room."

Fjara is a rhapsody in silver - a homage to the tension between structure and freedom, between stillness and movement. It reflects the orderly chaos of nature, in which nothing is perfect - and yet everything is harmonious.

I don't see Fjara as pure furniture, but as a kind of landscape - like a piece of Icelandic coastline that opens up over time - and reveals a new meaning with every perspective."



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
